What is it

Local government reorganisation

Local government reorganisation changes the structure of councils.

Devolution

This is the transfer of powers and funding from national government to local government.

A unitary authority provides all the local services which are currently delivered by county, city, district, and borough councils

What we know

Local government reorganisation

- In December 2024, the government set out plans to create 'single-tier' unitary authorities in places in England where a two-tier system, e.g. a county council and district or borough councils, still operated. East Sussex is one of these places.
- A single authority will deliver all local services, for example: education, transport, planning, fire and public safety, social care, libraries, waste management, trading standards (currently delivered by county councils); rubbish collection, recycling, council tax collections, housing, planning applications (currently delivered by district, borough, and city councils).
- The six current councils in East Sussex have submitted a proposal to the national government called 'One East Sussex', bringing the six current councils together.
- Other proposals have been submitted by Brighton & Hove City Council and West Sussex councils.

Devolution

- In December 2024, the government also published plans to transfer more powers from central government to local government, along with the creation of a Mayoral Combined County Authority.
- The election for the mayor is due to be 4th May 2028, to give time for the new unitary authorities to be established.

What we don't know

- Which of the proposals for new unitary authorities will be taken forward. *This should be known by the end of March 2026.*
- How any of the changes might affect SEND services.
